ABOUT US...

The Farming Life Centre supports the farming and rural community of the Derbyshire and Staffordshire Peak District.

We have run continuous projects to address the (often hidden) health, social and economic inequalities and deprivation within the upland farming community, which are delivered at outreach locations and from our base in the Agricultural Business Centre in Bakewell.

The underlying ethos of all our initiatives is to improve the resilience of the rural community by supporting residents of all ages to deal with their challenges in a timely way – before they reach a point of crisis.

The Farming Life Centre is open to everyone living in rural communities. We accept self-referrals as well as referrals from social care and health professionals.

Over the years the charity has successfully developed and run projects in the fields of mental and physical health, heritage, the arts, business support and development, skills development and confidence building



Walking for Health Group

Led by trained walk leaders: Pauline Bramley, John Thomas and Kay Allinson. Short "easy" walks were planned which started from a different location each month and followed good paths with plenty of points of farming interest to see. The walks took place on Thursday afternoons starting at 1.30pm. The walks generally aim to do a circular route which takes about one hour at a steady, easy pace. Some routes include stiles and/or short ascents and descents. Wherever possible there is an opportunity to visit a café afterwards for refreshments and a good chat.



Rural Social Groups

They are lively meetings of retired and semi retired farmers and family members who meet for tea and a chat with meals out and a variety of guest speakers.

The social groups are based in:

- Ashford in the Water which met weekly at the 'War Memorial Institute'
- Hartington a monthly meeting at the Village Hall
- Boylestone just south of Ashbourne based at the Methodist Church met monthly on a Thursday.

Celebrating Farming - Past, Present and Future

Peak Land Lives is a small part of a project called "Landscape at a Crossroads" which is a five year £3.9m scheme funded by the Heritage Lottery fund.



The Farming Life Centre is running this project with local authors, historians and photographers Christine Gregory and Sheila Hine.

Tracing changes in farming since the second world war. The book was published in September 2019 and is now being sold in a number of bookshops, Tourist Information Centres, online and at agricultural events and livestock market gatherings.

The Macmillan Rural Health Outreach Service



The Macmillan Rural Health Outreach Service, funded by Macmillan, was founded in 2014 in partnership with Voluntary & Community Services Peaks & Dales. The Service had been put in place in recognition of the particular challenges faced by farming and rural people in Derbyshire when they are affected by cancer and other life limiting conditions. It could provide information and support for those rural people affected by ill-health and long term conditions.

It was originally funded for two years, then Farming Life Centre were contracted to deliver the service and are now engaged in a four year stepped programme until 2022. The Service is there for carers, family and friends. It is coordinated by Rachel Metcalfe who was available to talk to in confidence about any worries and concerns. Many people find that by simply talking through their situation they are able to discover new and better ways of coping.

The co-ordinator hosted a fortnightly drop-in on market day at Bakewell Agricultural Business Centre where people could call in for a chat, a bit of light refreshment and pick up information on sources of support available in the local area.



The Project has faced challenges in its delivery during 2020, as the unforeseen impact of a global pandemic reached very rural Derbyshire. The Project has been able to adapt some services and retain connections with vulnerable people. When restrictions ease there could also be an increase in support needed by those who have not accessed cancer and other health treatments during the pandemic. Some of the online activity is likely to continue to flourish and be enjoyed by participants, and may only require light touch support for example, with identifying speakers and any technical issues. It will be interesting to evaluate this in Year 3 and to understand more about the challenges and benefits of this type of support.

The funding tapered arrangement, together with the impact of the pandemic, means that additional funds will be required to support the project's long-term ability to succeed.

Rural Reconnections:



The National Lottery Local Connections Fund helped us to reconnect with all our beneficiaries during challenging times. A garden centre voucher was sent out along with a message of hope and support, letting them know we were thinking about them. 100 garden vouchers distributed to all FLC beneficiaries, friends, supporters and volunteers. These were really well received and the project contributed to helping to reduce loneliness and isolation. Funding was spent by 31st March 2021

Thank you very much for our Easter card and especially the garden vouchers, we very much appreciate them and will enjoy spending them, we are making a new border in the garden at the moment so they will come in handy.'



Chair Based Pilates:

A great opportunity for some of our Rural Social Group members to access something a little different. A 'Five Ways to Wellbeing' grant from Derbyshire Dales Council for Voluntary Service helped towards providing 45 sessions with a qualified instructor.

Members of the community were encouraged to come together to reconnect and begin to develop their physical strength in order for them to keep mobile and well.

The Prince's Countryside Fund - Rural Resilience & Business Development:

A new project for 2021. Lorna Critchlow joined The Farming Life Centre team in February as our new Rural Resilience and Business Development Coordinator. Lorna is on hand to offer practical support while helping rural businesses to access workshops, networking events and other support groups in the area. A number of face-to face and online sessions have been planned for 2021-2022.



Volunteers

Volunteers are recruited through our friends, contacts, statutory partners and via our social media accounts. They form an essential part of the activities of the organisation.

Volunteers helped support the Walking for Health group, Rural Social groups as well as helping with all things technical and provide invaluable support with the website.
